*** Groß-Berlin in Brasilien.** Oberst Gaelzer-Netto, der Kommissar der brasilianischen Bundesregierung, weilt gegenwärtig in Berlin, um das Verständnis für die Kolonisationspolitik Brasiliens zu erwecken und zur Beteiligung an der Weltausstellung in Rio de Janeiro 1922 anzuregen.

In der Deutsch-Südamerikanischen Gesellschaft sprach er jüngst über die Absichten und Ziele seiner Mission, und auf diesen Vortrag und seine weitere Tätigkeit ist es wohl auch zurückzuführen, daß eine Belebung der Anteilnahme für brasilianische Verhältnisse in der Reichshauptstadt zu verspüren ist. Exporthäuser und Industrieunternehmungen Groß-Berlins erwägen bereits den Plan einer Beteiligung an der Weltausstellung in Rio, deren Eröffnung erst am 7. September 1922 stattfindet. Brasilien feiert mit der Ausstellung das hundertjährige Gedächtnis seiner Unabhängigkeit, und wer den Vorträgen Gaelzer-Nettos beizuwohnen Gelegenheit hatte, wird gesehen haben, wela einen hervorragenden Anteil deutsche Pionierarbeit an Brasiliens Aufschwung und Unabhängigkeit hat. Brasilien ist ein keineswegs deutschfeindliches Land, dessen gute Beziehungen mit dem Deutschen Reiche durch den Weltkrieg zwar unterbrochen, aber nicht aufgehoben werden konnten. Besonders Groß-Berliner Firmen stehen im lebhaftesten Handelsverlehr mit brasilianischen Hauptplätzen. Oberst Gaelzer-Netto zeigt in prächtigen Lichtbildern die einzigartigen Schönheiten seiner tropischen Heimat. Sie erwecken in uns Groß-Berlinern eine starke Sehnsucht nach den brasilianischen Palmen, unter denen man — ungestraft wandeln kann!



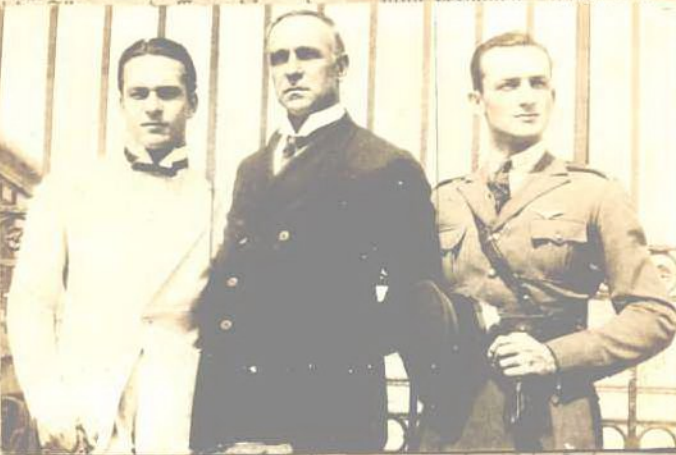

Oberst Gaezler Netto, ein Beauftragter der brasilianischen Regierung, besuchte in Begleitung seiner Gemahlin verschiedene Anstalten und Säuglingsheime, von dem Wunsche beseelt, durch Spenden seiner Regierung helfen zu können, wo die Hilfe am nötigsten erscheint. Das Augusta-Hospital, die Kriegsmutterhilfe, das Frauenheim und die Werkstätten (Professor Magelse Gründung), die unter Leitung des Roten Kreuzes stehen, die Tuberkulosenabteilung für Kinder in der Landesversicherungsanstalt und das Säuglingsheim des Städt. Waisenhauses (Schmidt-Gallisch-Stiftung) sind zunächst besichtigt worden.

Brasilien und seine Kolonisation.

In der Aula der Handelshochschule hielt kürzlich der brasilianische Bundeskommissar, Oberst Gae-
 lger-Netto, der bekanntlich in besonderer Mission von seiner
 Regierung in Rio de Janeiro nach Europa geschickt wurde, einen
 wertvollen Vortrag über Brasilien und seine Kolo-
 nisation. Nach einem Ueberblick über die vergeblichen Be-
 mühungen, den eingeborenen Indianer zu einem brauchbaren
 Landarbeiter und Viehzüchter zu machen, gab der Vortragende
 ein Bild der großen Arbeit, die der Jesuitenorden im 17. und
 18. Jahrhundert geleistet hat, als er die vor den Sklaven-
 jägern flüchtenden Indianer in seinen Reduktionen sammelte, die
 zu blühenden Ansiedlungen auf theokratischer Grundlage wurden.
 Sie zerfielen, als der Jesuitenorden 1760 durch Dekrete der
 Regierungen in Madrid und Lissabon ihres Besitzes in Süd-
 amerika verlustig erklärt wurden. Erst 1818 ist von einer eigent-
 lichen Kolonisation in unserem Sinne wieder die Rede. Don
 Pedro I., der nachmalige erste Kaiser Brasiliens, ließ Nora Tri-
 burgo im heutigen Staate Rio de Janeiro anlegen. Andere Ver-
 suche folgten und zwar gerade in den tropischen Landstrichen.

Ein Vortrag über Brasilien.

Im überfüllten Hörsaal des Museums für Völkertunde hielt Oberst Gaezler Netto den zweiten seiner angekündigten Vorträge über sein Heimatland Brasilien. Den Industriellen im Auditorium bot er außerordentlich wertvolle Anregungen. Er legte die Fortschritte der Technik und Industrie in Brasilien klar und gab unter anderem als Mittelung die Nachricht, dass brasilianischen Säbmen Japan Dienst gestellt sind. Es ist die Zeit, daß die Industrie der Kriegszeit bei dem Einfuhr eines ungeheuren gemeinsamen Markt mit den Völkern versorgt. Die Nationen des europäischen Kontinents des Landes verdrängt, was die Menge der brasilianischen Erze ist. Auch die nationale Industrie ist unabhängig vom Ausland, aber ist die Schaffung der Industrie, da Rohstoffe im Land an Eisenbergen und Kohlen sind. Gerade jetzt sind in Brasilien Laboratorien Versuchsbroschüren brasilianischer Erze unterhalten Kohlen mit günstigsten Preisen gewonnen. Mit der Erschließung für Brasilien auch die Valorisierung außerordentlich günstige Preise stabil mit Weltmarkt. Es schwebt daher der Plan auf sämtliche brasilianische Erze zu verfeinern und so dem jetzigen Markt eine weitere Bestandteile zu verleihen. In dem Tage der Jahrhundertfeier Brasiliens, wird die in Rio de Janeiro errichteten Nationen mit ihren Erzeugnissen. Leider ist es die Rücksicht auf die Reparaturen Brasiliens, wie man sich offiziell an der Weltmarkt wohl aber werden private Erzeugnissen dort freudiger zu begrüßen. Handelsmarkt gerade wieder bevorzugt, nachdem die handelsmäßige Einfuhr ein Notstandsgesetz zur Unterstützung des Importhandels erforderlich machte. Oberst Gaezler streifte in einem historischen Rückblick auch die Politik der Wiedergutmachung, welche der Bundespräsident Dr. Epitacio Pessoa in einer Weise erledigt, die wichtig und vorteilhaft von den Gewohnheiten anderer Weltmächten abweicht. Mit einem Ausblick auf die Zukunft der Beziehungen zwischen dem Deutschen Reich und Brasilien, einer Uebersicht über die wertvolle Produktion von Ackerbau und Viehzucht und einer Würdigung der zielbewußten Politik keiner Regierung und ihrer Organe schloß der Vortragende seine Darlegungen, die den reichen Bestand der ansehnlichen Versammlung wohl verdienten.

Gegen Erhöhung der Kaffeezölle

In der letzten Sitzung der Deutsch-Südamerikanischen Gesellschaft zu Berlin nahm der Bundeskommissar der Vereinigten Staaten von Brasilien Gelegenheit, auf die etwaigen Folgen hinzuweisen, welche die behauptete Erhöhung der deutschen Zölle auf Rohstoffe zwischen Deutschland und Brasilien könnte. Mit Recht betonte die deutsche Auffassung der Kaffeegenutzmittel zu betrachten und die Kategorie der mit Recht unter stehenden Einfuhrwaren einzuzählen sei der Genus von Kaffee in langer Zeit zur Volksgeworden. Die deutsche Ausfuhr ist Brasilien als einen der wertvollsten für die Zukunft, und es werde jene Markt für deutsche Waren, die Speicher für Rohstoffe für die Zukunft bleiben.



Der Bundeskommissar betonte bei einer Belastung des Kaffees an der Grenze sofort in Brasilien der Wettbewerb diesen Anlaß zu benützen wird, um die zu unfreundliche Stimmung in Brasilien und die neue deutsche Zollpolitik eine Unfreundlichkeit der deutschen gegen Brasilien darzustellen. Bedauerlicher, als auch auf der in Rio de Janeiro nichtdeutsche, sondern die Nordamerikaner, die Klagen machen, um die Erzeugung in glänzendster Form zur während Deutschland unter den Nationen nicht in der Lage ist, in diesem Hause auf der Ausstellung die Leistungen seiner Technik darzu-

stellen, besteht die Absicht, bei den hohen den Goldausschlag von 3200 Mark zu erhöhen. Das würde die Verteuerung des Kaffees bedeuten, und die Ausfuhr jedes Kaffees Brasiliens, erschweren. Der Bundeskommissar will an Hand dem Material bieten für die Tatsache, daß eine Erhöhung des Zolles auf Rohkaffee in Wirklichkeit dem Reich keine Vermehrung der Einnahmen bringen kann.

Das Studium auf der Sporthochschule.

Die Entwicklung der Lehrgänge.

Einen interessanten Einblick in das Wesen der Berliner „Sporthochschule“ und den Lehrgang des Stud. gymn. gewährt das von Dr. Karl Diem soeben herausgegebene Buch „Die deutsche Hochschule für Leibesübungen“. Die Anstalt, deren Gründung im Oktober 1919 von dem Deutschen Reichsausschuß für Leibesübungen beschlossen wurde, ist am 15. Mai 1920 ins Leben gerufen worden. Sie verfolgt den Zweck, wissenschaftlich geschulte Lehrkräfte für die Leibesübungen heranzubilden und alle auf die Theorie, Praxis und Geschichte der Leibesübungen bezüglich Befehle zu erforschen. Die Hochschule, die als private Lehrstätte begründet wurde, ist ein Selbstverwaltungskörper; sie regelt die Berufung der Lehrer, den Unterricht und die Forschungsarbeit aus eigener Machtvollkommenheit. In wirtschaftlichen Dingen bedarf sie der Zustimmung des Deutschen Reichsausschusses für Leibesübungen, der für die Kosten der Anstalt aufkommt. Das Berliner Stadion, in dem auf dem großen Aufmarschraum hinter der Schwimmbahntribüne ein besonderes Hochschulgebäude errichtet wurde, ist ihr Heim.

Der Lehrkörper ist in vier Abteilungen gegliedert: Übungslehre, Gesundheitslehre, Erziehungslehre und Verwaltungslehre. Die Zahl der immatrikulierten Studenten beträgt seit der Gründung 150, die der Besucher der Berliner Volkshochschulkurse 9129.

Völlige Gesundheit, geübte körperliche Kraft und Geschicklichkeit, Schwimmfertigkeit und allgemeine Eignung ist selbstverständliche Voraussetzung für die Aufnahme. Jeder Studierende wird auf seinen Gesundheitszustand vor der Immatrikulation untersucht. Es wird Universitätsreise (Reisezeugnis einer neunstufigen deutschen Lehranstalt oder Zeugnis über bestandene Lehrerprüfung) verlangt. Ohne Universitätsreise können vom Senat auf Grund besonderer Entschliebung Studierende zugelassen werden, die sich durch hervorragende körperliche Begabung und Bewährung im praktischen Vereinsleben ausgezeichnet haben. Das Studium dauert sechs Semester, davon sind die ersten vier der körperlichen und wissenschaftlichen Ausbildung, die letzten zwei der praktischen Einführung in den Lehrberuf und der Vervollkommnung im Sonderfach vorz.

Erziehung. In ihnen allen muß sich der Student betätigt haben. Die Fächer werden auf die vier Semester verteilt, allgemeine gymnastische Übungen, Leichtathletik und Schwimmen wird im Sommer nahezu täglich geübt, im Winter tritt Gervataturen und Gellertübung, wie Ringen und Bogens, mehr in den Vordergrund. Im allgemeinen werden pro Tag 2 bis 4 Stunden körperliche Übung anempfohlen und verlangt. Jeder einzelne kann sich den Ausbildungsplan so formen, daß er schwache Stellen seines Körpers ausgleicht und andererseits seiner Begabung und seiner Neigung Rechnung trägt. Den Wintersport und den Bergsport pflegen die Studenten auf besonderen, eine oder zwei Wochen dauernden Ausflügen. Der wissenschaftliche Unterricht bringt in der Abteilung Übungslehre zunächst einmal die Wettkampfvorgaben und die Theorie der Leibesübungen, praktische Lehr- und Schiedsrichterübungen laufen die ganze Studienzeit hindurch.

In der Gesundheitslehre wird die Kenntnis vom Bau des menschlichen Körpers vermittelt, und zwar Zellen-, Knochen-, Bänder-, Muskel-, Eingeweide- und Nervenlehre. Der Wissensstoff wird dem zukünftigen Beruf gemäß abgestimmt. Das gleiche gilt für die Physiologie (Blutkreislauf, Atmung und Ernährung, Stoffwechsel und Sinnesorgane) und die besondere Physiologie der Leibesübungen. Die Studenten werden mit den einfachen physiologischen Untersuchungsmethoden vertraut gemacht. Aus der Hygiene wird das Gebiet der Körperpflege besonders behandelt, Ausbildung und Pflege der Haut, der Atmungsorgane, Abhärtung und Kleidung, Geschlechtsleben, allgemeine Lebensführung, Wirkung der Massage, praktische Massage, Massage bei Sportverletzungen usw., Wirkung von Licht-, Luft- und Wasserbadern. Die Konstitutionslehre bringt den Wechsel der Körperbeschaffenheit in den verschiedenen Lebensaltern beider Geschlechter, die Einwirkung von Beruf und Sport auf den Körperbau, Beziehung zwischen Körperbau und Körperleistung, Vererbung, Theorie und Praxis der Körpermessung, Konstitutionsstatistik.

Die Abteilung Erziehungslehre vermittelt zunächst die philosophischen Grundlagen und gewährt eine Uebersicht über die allgemeine Pädagogik und Psychologie. Auf den philosophischen, psychologischen und naturwissenschaftlichen Grundlagen der Erziehungslehre heben sich dann die besonderen Methoden in der Pädagogik und Didaktik des Turnfachs ab.

In der Abteilung Verwaltungslehre wird die Geschichte der Leibesübungen im Zusammenhang mit der allgemeinen Kulturgeschichte vorgelesen. Außerdem werden die Studierenden mit der Geschichte und der Organisation der Turn- und Sportverbände des In- und Auslandes, mit Zeitungswesen und Literatur vertraut gemacht. Die Studenten lernen ferner Vortrag und freie Rede in einem besonderen Seminar. Die Stellung von Reich, Staat und Gemeinden, sowie der ausländischen Regierungen zur Leibesübung ist ein weiteres Gebiet dieses Faches. Schließlich werden die Studenten im Übungsstätten- und Sportplatzbau unterrichtet und müssen selbständige Entwürfe anfertigen. Dies ist im wesentlichen der Inhalt des Studiums, der in großen, wiederkehrenden Hauptvorlesungen festgelegt ist.

Kaffeezölle und deutsch-brasilische Beziehungen.

In der letzten Sitzung der Deutsch-Südamerikanischen Gesellschaft zu Berlin nahm der Bundeskommissar der Vereinigten Staaten von Brasilien Gelegenheit, auf die ev. Folgen hinzuweisen, welche die beabsichtigte Erhöhung der deutschen Zölle auf Rohkaffee bei der Einfuhr in Deutschland für das Verhältnis zwischen Brasilien und dem Deutschen Reich haben könnte. Er betonte, daß auch nach deutscher Auffassung der Kaffee nicht als reines Genußmittel zu betrachten und daher nicht in die Kategorie der mit Recht unter hohen Zollsatz zu stellenden Einfuhrwaren einzureihen sei; vielmehr ist der Genuß von Kaffee in Deutschland seit langer Zeit zur Volksgewohnheit geworden. Die deutsche Ausfuhr betrachtet Brasilien als einen wertvollen Markt für die Zukunft. Brasilien werde zumal bei dem vorherrschenden Charakter der Zollpolitik Nordamerikas nicht nur der offene Markt für deutsche Waren, sondern auch ein Speicher für Rohstoffe für den deutschen Industriellen bleiben.

Der brasilianische Bundeskommissar betont seine Sorge, daß bei einer Belastung des Kaffees, des Hauptausfuhrartikels seines Vaterlandes, an der deutschen Grenze sofort der nicht deutsche Wettbewerb in Brasilien diesen Anlaß zu einer Propaganda benutzen wird, um die zunehmende deutschfreundliche Stimmung in Brasilien zu veräuffeln und die neue deutsche Zollgesetzgebung als eine Unfreundlichkeit der deutschen Regierung gegen Brasilien darzustellen. Das wäre um so bedauerlicher, als auch auf der Weltausstellung in Rio de Janeiro nicht-deutsche Nationen, besonders die Nordamerikaner, die größten Anstrengungen machen, um die Erzeugnisse ihrer Industrie in glänzender Form zur Schau zu stellen, während Deutschland unter der Last der Reparationen nicht in der Lage ist, in einem eigenen Hause auf der Ausstellung die hervorragenden Leistungen seiner Technik darzubieten.

Der brasilianische Bundeskommissar wird an Hand amtlicher Statistiken den deutschen Gesetzgebern das Material bieten für die Erwartung, daß eine Erhöhung des Zolles auf Rohkaffee in Wirklichkeit dem Reich keine Vermehrung der Einnahmen bringen wird.

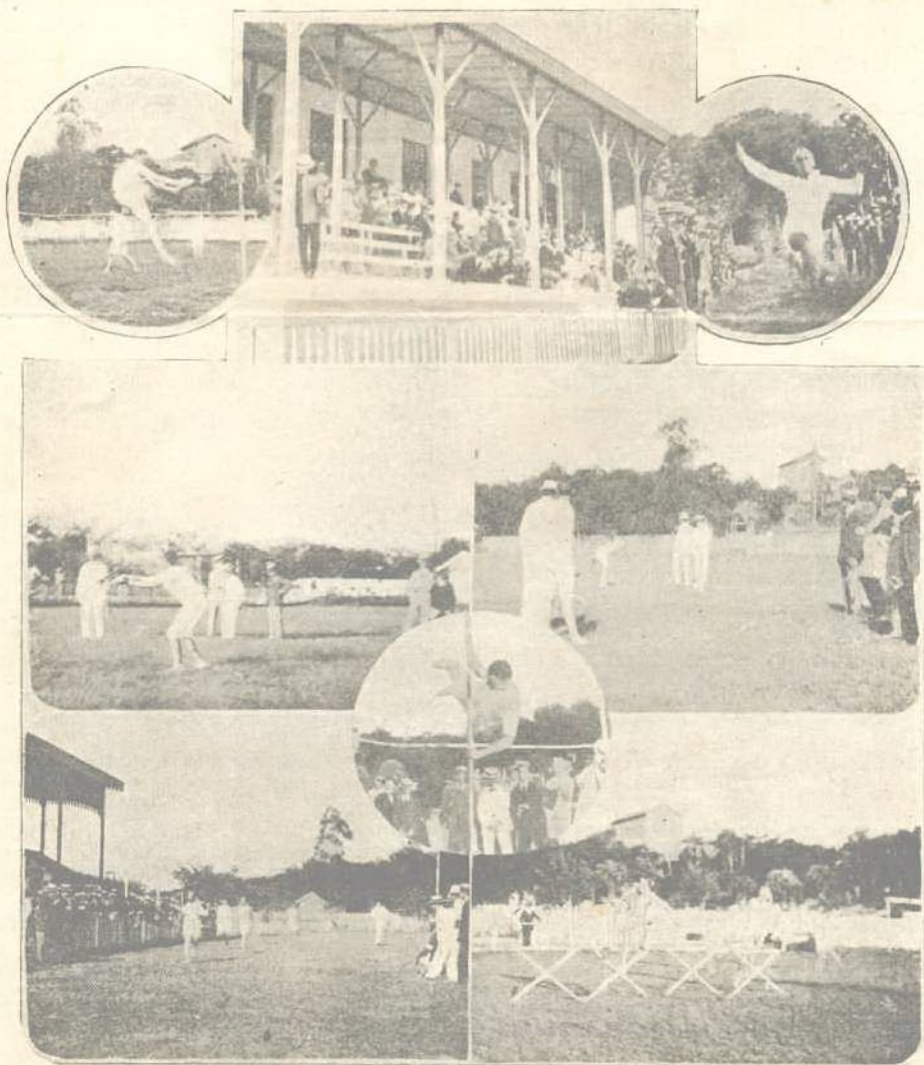

A obra dos estudantes norte-americanos contra o alcoolismo

Um appello aos collegas dos outros paizes

Organisou-se nos Estados Unidos uma associação de classe academica destinada exclusivamente a combater o uso do alcool na grande Republica. Intitula-se The Inter-collegiate Prohibition Association e tem sua sede em Chicago.

O trabalho da Associação Anti-Alcoolica Inter-Academica concretisa hoje uma memoravel phase das actividades dos academicos norte-americanos que nessa campanha realisam um alto idealismo. Incentivados pela visao de que a mocidade estudiosa, guia futura da vida publica, é capaz de levar á méta qualquer nobre cruzada, os chefes academicos congregaram-se para reunir forças dispensas e caminharem em auxilio da nação que se debatia contra o trafico alcoolico.

A organização academica adoptou para a luta o lemma:—instrucção, decisão e accção. Tres bases estrategicas transmittidas a todos os filiados espalhados pelo vasto territorio da nação amiga.

Foi instituido um concurso oratorio que produziu 10.000 discursos originaes para serem pronnciados perante um numero superior a 3 milhões de pessoas.

Nas materias de estudo de 100 academias e universidades, foi cuidada a propaganda contra o alcool. Esses mesmos estabelecimentos apresentaram cursos baseados no programma da Associação Anti-Alcoolica Inter-Academica e outras 125 instituições fizeram cursos livres de estudos sobre o alcool. Delegados da associação apresentaram annualmente, a mais de 100 mil pesosas, todos os pormenores do problema.

Realisaram-se centenas de prelecções. Por meio de concurso, jornalistas publicaram originaes contra o alcoolismo. Cerca de 1 mil estudantes, no curto espaço de um anno serviram como auxiliares da campanha. O habito do uso de bebida alcoolica nas academias foi investigado com rigor e combatido satisfatoriamente. Centenas de petições e milhares de cartas os estudantes expediram aos principaes legisladores norte-americanos, tudo com grande sacrificio de sua parte, não só pecuniariamente como pelo prejuizo de tempo e dispendio de energia, desviados de horas dedicadas ao preparo de seus estudos.

A execução desse programma veio indemnizar-lhes o esforço empregado porque teve parte saliente no movimento victorioso que terminou pela prohibição completa do uso de bebidas alcoolicas nos Estados Unidos.

A humilhação da Associação não se contentou com a campanha feita na sua patria. Ella quer estender seus resultados aos demais paizes, com o fito de ver realisada a grande obra de livrar a humanidade do maior mal que lhe corroe a existencia. Neste sentido, a Associação appella para os estudantes das outras nações. Os academicos dos outros paizes, dizem os norte-americanos, acham-se em face de grande oportunidade de combater o trafico alcoolico, com uma percentagem de recursos incalculavelmente superior á que jámais dispuzeram os academicos da Norte America.

Os 500 mil estudantes europeus, os 300 mil asiaticos, os 30 mil africanos, os 60 da America do Sul e Central e os 10 mil australianos assumem papel saliente nos programmaes sociaes e politicos nos seus paizes e, mesmo, até nos continentes, o que não acontece com os dos Estados Unidos. O numero de estudantes em outros paizes está em proporção inferior á intensidade da população, offerecendo por isto oportunidade de tornarem-se "leaders" da nação e da sociedade. Em relação ao dos Estados Unidos, é triplicado ou quadruplicado o campo de acção dos academicos dos outros paizes.

A grande maioria dos estudantes dos outros paizes, principalmente das Americas Central e do Sul, passa dos bancos das Universidades para as cadeiras da representação nacional e, ainda, têm poderosa influencia dentro dos recintos academicos. Consequentemente, lembra a Associação, na futura campanha que visa o anniquillamento universal do alcoolismo, os estudantes dos outros paizes terão parte mais saliente do que os norte-americanos. Com este objectivo a Associação tem organizado um movimento universal academico contra o alcoolismo. Esta acção dirigida em meio dos dias de reconstrucção do mundo, depois da recente guerra, por força será bafejada pelos resultados mais favoraveis.

A Associação tem recebido innumerados pedidos dos estudantes de outras nações para lhes enviar, urgentemente, conselhos e meios de cooperação. Neste momento, porém, o trabalho mais importante dos norte-americanos é o de provar o valor e a efficacia da prohibição norte-americana.

Student Department Organizes International Foreign Student Council



International Foreign Student Council

Six thousand young men are now studying in the colleges and universities in Chicago to prepare themselves for leadership in business and professional life. Almost lost in this large number of American boys is a small group of 400 foreign students representing 30 different nationalities, who have come from all corners of the earth to secure their education here. Being foreigners they are denied much that American boys can enjoy and frequently they are without friends—in a strange land and a strange city.

Realizing the isolation of this group and in some cases finding not only loneliness but actual distress among these men, the Student Department of the Chicago Y. M. C. A. has organized an International Student Council which aims to bring together for fellowship, and assist whenever necessary the foreign students in Chicago and in every way put more into their lives. Mr. L. C. Hollister, city student secretary and father of the idea has called this council the "League of Nations" and with over 20 nationalities represented it is in some respects not unlike the great league. In its membership there is one representative each from Armenia, Japan, Brazil, India, China, Cuba, Mexico, South Africa, Philippines, Barbados, America, Holland, Germany, Peru, Egypt, Sweden, Assyria, Jamaica and Dutch Guiana. Luther Alepian, an Armenian student at McCormick Seminary is president of the Council, F. B. Colon, a young Spaniard from Porto Rico, who is studying for the ministry at Moody Institute is Vice-President, and Silvestre Pascual, from the Philippines is Secretary and Treasurer.

The Council has set for itself this five-fold purpose:

1. To keep a record of the arrival and whereabouts of every student in Chicago.
2. To further the spiritual interests of each man.
3. To promote friendly relations between the members of the various national groups.
4. To secure greater hospitality and friendliness toward these men on the part of American citizens.
5. To provide foreign students as speakers for churches, schools and civic organizations.

PAT PAGE DAY' FOR BUTLERITES

Popular Coach Honored as Team Fights Closing Football Battle of Season.

"Pat Page Day" will be observed tomorrow by Butler students and followers of the Blue and White. Friday has been set aside at the Irvington Institution in honor of their miracle man in athletics. Starting early in September, with only mediocre material, Coach Page has had remarkable success on the gridiron. Although the 1920 gridlers have won the I. C. A. L. championship and have a record of six consecutive victories, fans are looking forward to the coming years and are anticipating still greater success for the Butler teams in the future.

Butler will start her big day of the season at 12:30, when Wabash High will tussle with Bloomfield High School on Irwin field for the championship of the prep schools of Indiana. Immediately after this contest Butler's final day of the year will be played, when the Bulldogs meet the highly touted Chicago Y. M. C. A. eleven. Victory or defeat, Butler students will celebrate the success of the closing gridiron season following the Chicago game. Headed by Yell Leader Paul Draper, the rooters are planning to pow wow near the college campus and after an hour of snake dancing and yelling throughout Irvington, huge bonfires will be lighted near the gridiron.

Chicago Feels Page Loss.

Chicago university has keenly felt the loss of Coach Page and for the first time in history at Chicago the gridiron team has lost three consecutive games. Pre-season prospects at Chicago pointed to one of the greatest teams that had ever been turned out under Maroon colors, then Page left the Big Ten school and moved to Butler. Six straight wins, the secondary championship of Indiana and a total of 257 points is what Coach Page has done for the Indianapolis college in football during the 1920 season.

The Chicago eleven is coming to Indianapolis determined to win over the Page outfit. So far it has defeated all secondary colleges in Illinois and has walloped such teams as Wheaton, Beloit, Lake Forest, Kalamazoo Normal, and Northwestern college. A win over Page would give it a great boost in Chicago. A large party of rooters will accompany the Y. M. C. A. eleven here.

Dope Favors Chicago.

Despite that dope slightly favors the physical directors, Butler rooters are confident of victory. The eleven to represent Butler this year has the most smashing offense ever seen at Irwin field and the Chicagoans may feel assured they will find tough sledding against the Blue and White gridlers.

Several of the Butler squad are suffering with minor injuries, but most of the varsity will be available for the final encounter. Capt. Brown has not been able to practice during the week and will be very likely to sit on the sidelines. K. Moore will not be in condition to finish the season, but the rest of the varsity will probably start in their regular positions.

The Butler cross-country team will not compete for honors at Urbana tomorrow in the Conference meet. Originally Page expected to send the Blue and White harriers, who have made a splendid showing over the state this year. Three of the regulars are freshmen and are not qualified to enter the Urbana race.

BUTLER CLOSES TODAY AGAINST CHICAGO SQUAD

Blue and White Ranks in Battered Condition for Season's Finale—Banquet at Claypool to Follow Game.

WINDUP OF BUTLER'S MOST SUCCESSFUL GRID SEASON BY ORVILLE HOOKER.

Playing its final practice of the 1929 football season, Butler yesterday snapped through a short signal drill before the student body of the Irvington institution who witnessed the last preparation for the Butler-Chicago Y. M. C. A. college contest. Several varsity men were absent from the Blue and White team yesterday and the eleven that faces the Chicagoans today will be in a battered condition.

Capt. Phil Brown, Leslie and K. Moore were unable to attend the last practice because of injuries received in the Rose Poly game of last Saturday. It has been definitely announced that Brown and Moore, varsity tackle and guard, respectively, will not line up against the Y. M. C. A. college. There is a possible chance for Leslie, the lanky left end, to be in condition for part of the fray, but it is very probable that he will be on the sidelines most of the time.

Both the Butler and Chicago teams will average near the same weight and will compare almost equally in experience. The Windy City lads have five on the team who have never had college varsity experience, while the rest of the eleven is composed of men who have previously played for one or two years.

Brazilian Star.

Gaelzer, a Brazilian, is proving the star for the Y. M. C. A. eleven this season and has been playing a great game on the line. Morrow, the giant center, is the heaviest man on the Chicago team, tipping the scales near the 220-pound mark. The physical directors will rely on Capt. Passell to make their gains against the Bulldogs. Passell has been hitting the line in style this year and has established somewhat of a record with his ability in open field running.

The final Butler game today will wind up the most successful season that Butler has known for several years. Prospects for the gridiron team of next year are very bright with only one man being lost from the varsity. Bob Bastain, who has been playing the back field for the Blue and White during some of the games, is the only player up in the Butler team. Most of the varsity is composed of freshmen and sophomores and Coach Page will have an experienced squad to work with next season.

Over 200 are expected at the banquet in the Riley room of the Claypool this evening. The banquet will be the final affair for the Butler gridgers and followers.

BUTLER ANNEXES CHICAGO BATTLE

Y. M. C. A. Collegiate Champs Defeated by Local Eleven, 9-0.

Butler yesterday defeated Chicago Y. M. C. A. college, collegiate champions of Michigan and Illinois, by a score of 9 to 0 in the final game of the season on Irwin field.

Perfect teamwork on the part of the local eleven and the spectacular open-field running of Edgren, the opposition's left half, featured the game. Graham of Butler played a strong game at both offensive and defensive, assisted on offense by almost perfect interference.

Butler, evidently a little overcome with the weight of the "Y" eleven, was driven back to its own one-yard line with rushes by Edgren and Stauffer. Chicago failed to make the distance, and Graham kited. The ball was carried off the field on the twenty-yard line, but Butler, by an intercepted forward pass, again took the onalve.

Steady line rushing took the ball to midfield, when Graham, on a cross shift, ran thirty yards. The first score of the game was made near the end of the quarter, when Passell, Chicago full back, fumbled and was downed behind his own goal line.

Kicking Takes Lead.

Following a tough second quarter in which neither team gained a decided advantage, both elevens turned to kicking. Butler blocked an attempted place kick on their thirty-yard line. Butler received a kick on the forty-yard line, and McCliffin and Graham made steady gains for forty yards, when the former, receiving a pass, ran ten yards for a touchdown. H. Duttonhaver kicked goal.

Despite a broken hand received in the Rose Poly game a week ago, Phil Bown, Butler captain, was allowed to take Saunder's place at the beginning of the third quarter. Butler, by steady playing, forced the ball to Chicago's twenty-yard line. Chicago again got the ball and carried it back to Butler territory, but the game ended with the ball in Butler's possession on the Chicago twenty-eight-yard line.

The game yesterday made Butler's seventh consecutive victory. Butler lost the first game of the season to Wittenberg, collegiate champions of Ohio. In the last seven games Butler has made a total of 34 points against their opponent's 31 points.

Chicago, besides claiming the state championships of Michigan and Illinois, has a good claim to the championship of Wisconsin. Yesterday was their first defeat of the season.

The cost of the camp above the car fare amounted to less than 17 cents a meal. The camp was under the leadership of W. L. Cowie of the Hyde Park "Y," Boys' Division, assisted by F. E. Gaeltzer.

The school athletics have been quite successful this year. Several games of basketball have been played, and most of the games won by the Ray School teams. Once our team lost a game through overconfidence. They had beaten the team, that of Hyde Park High School Branch, badly once before and therefore expected to do it again, but the High School boys, three of them former X-Rays, as Mr. Shea used to say, were better prepared this time and gained several points before our boys had awakened to the fact that they had a harder job ahead of them than before. It was a good lesson. Miss Schmook, who is our regular Gymnasium instructor, now takes the girls in the after school classes, while Mr. Gaeltzer, of the Y. M. C. A., has the boys. Miss Hardy has a large class in folk and gymnastic dancing once every week. It is the best arrangement we have ever had, and is bringing the best results.

The after-school classes in basketball for the eighth and seventh grade boys and girls were started two weeks ago, under the direction of Mr. Gaeltzer, of the Hyde Park Y. M. C. A. It has also been planned to organize several boys' clubs, to meet some place on 55th Street two or three evenings a week through the winter. This will give the boys some wholesome recreation and a decent place in which to gather, where they may play games, hold club meetings, and take gymnasium work and play basketball. Such a place is greatly needed, and one will be much appreciated.

YOUNG AMERICA, when athletically inclined, cannot be stopped, and one example is the younger lads of the Hyde Park Y. M. C. A., who have leased a fire station at 1315 East 55th street and turned it into a gymnasium. The boys helped cover the windows with

wire, marked the floor and then replaced the clang of the fire engine with the happy yells of basket shooters and the excited whoops of baseball players.

The purpose of the fire hall boys' club is to get the boys off the street, which affords little chance for wholesome fun,

by providing a place where they can play indoor ball, basket ball, billiards, the victrola and read magazines. Frederico Gaelzer, son of the commissioner of Immigration for Brazil, is in charge of the club. Gaelzer is studying Y. M. C. A. physical training methods and plans to introduce them in his home country.

AS SEEN in the headlines this will be a pretty hard proposition to accomplish in behalf of my still poor English; nevertheless I will do my best to fulfill my duty.

I started my work on May 11th at the Ray School with orders of the Physical Department, to instruct the boys in track and field athletics for an event to be realized under the supervision of the Y. M. C. A. at the end of the month. The time that was given me was from 3 to 6, so I could hold the boys after school and keep them busy nearly three hours. We started with some agreeable games, changing to field and track, which was required to everyone, and finished with games of soccer, base-ball or relays. In spite of the bad ground and lack of apparatus the boys were regular in attendance and did their best for the School.

On May 29th the annual meet took place, and Ray School was classified in First Place with 64 points (second was granted with 49 points). Later on June 3rd the Athletic Meet of Tilden Technical took place and again Ray School was placed at the First Place, winning the title of South Side Grammar School Champion, and brought home five beautiful cups.

On the 11th I went to the Student Conference at Lake Geneva, from where I returned on the 21st and started the Summer Playground at Ray School. The

hours were from 6 to 9 in the evening. Immediately I tried to form teams or clubs and have a regular competition in the plays and attendances, but it was impossible because it was a daily choosing up of teams and we never could get the whole gang

out on the same day. The average attendance was 25; the number being greater at the start and closing of the season. The games consisted especially of base-ball (indoor and outdoor) and soccer.

Every Wednesday we went to the Y. M. C. A. where we had our weekly swim to the great pleasure of the boys. This swim was the only privilege that I could withdraw in case of indiscipline. But it being so appreciated it was only once necessary to take the swim away.

Not many hikes or trips were made in behalf that most of the boys were working, and we could not get appropriated hours for the same. We went once to Jackson park and once to Washington park where I rented some boats and it was a real pleasure to see some of them—poor boys—who for the first time in their lives were in a boat like that. Another time we went to Beverly Hills where we spent the whole day in games, rests, and hikes. The boys were glad to be in such a nice place away from the rushes of the city, and paying only for both ways a carfare of 8 cents.

During the season two important ball games with outside teams were registered. The first was against the Gang of Woodlawn Street which game we won with the score of 15 x 8 in our favor. The second game was against the North Side Jewish Alliance, losing this time with the score of 19 x 7. Both games were followed anxiously by the non players and roused great interest among the boys of the neighborhood.

Our policy was "no smoking and no gambling" on the grounds and very often

I had severe talks with the boys to enforce our rules. But the most difficulty was to bring the boys together at time of the games, and very frequently I had to bring them from the alleys where I found them shooting craps. This made me adopt the plan to walk always through the alleys to the ground, in this way I had always some more who perhaps were not thinking to attend our game on this special day.

When I was needed at the Boy's Division I helped out with pleasure, filling so my scheduled time, and learning in this way very much about Boy's Work what will help me very much in my future work.

In conclusion I have to say that I am very thankful to the staff of the Hyde Park Y. M. C. A. and to the Principal Rape of Ray School, to have given me such an opportunity to learn and prepare myself to serve my God, my country and the Y. M. C. A. with a better understanding.

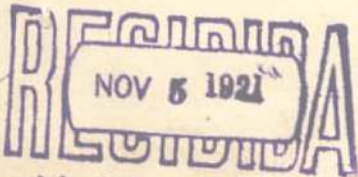

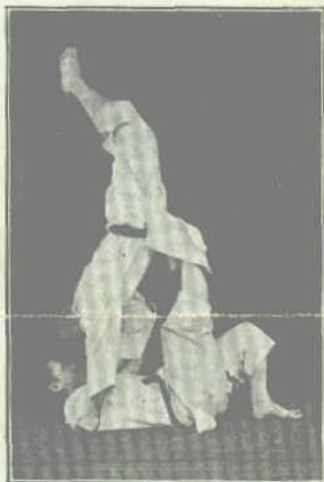

7 TEAMS IN TRAINING FOR POLICE GAMES

0 More Men Will Start Working Tomorrow for Special Events; Coaches Assigned.

THIRTY-SEVEN teams for a total of 900 men are in active training in parks, playgrounds and gymnasiums for the Police Field Games, to be held in Grant Park September 16 and 17, according to an announcement yesterday by Chief Morris. These are the contestants in the regular track and field events. In addition to these about 100 men will be in training, starting Monday, for the special and feature contests. Maj. Bauder, drill instructor of the Police Department, is preparing the men for the spectacular drill he is to stage as a part of the athletic program. The police men are rehearsing their exercises as well as for the feature events in which they will take part. The commanding officer of every team has been assigned from one of the 100 men to take charge of the training of the athletes to compose the teams. There will be a minimum of ten men to a team. As evidence of the interest the policemen are taking in the coming athletic event, many who are on their furlough have written to Capt. John Naughton, who has charge of the event, that they are putting in extra strokes to get into form.

ing, has so arranged the events that no man in the department will be overlooked, so far as participation in the meet is concerned. There will be a fifty-yard dash for men in the service over twenty years, a seventy-five-yard dash for men in the service over ten years and under twenty, and a fifty-yard dash for fat men, with a minimum weight of 200 pounds. A medley relay has been added in which the contestants will walk 440 yards, run 440 yards, ride a horse 880 yards and ride a motorcycle one mile.

Stage Mounted Tug of War.

In addition to the pushball game the mounted men will take part in a tug of war, with four horses and riders to a team. A watermelon race also has been added for the mounted men. At a given signal the riders pick up the melon from the ground, mount and ride 250 yards. The one arriving at the finish first with the melon wins. Should the melon be dropped the rider must dismount, pick up the melon, or the larger portion of it if broken, remount and continue to the finish.

One of the most exciting contests arranged for the mounted force is the cockade tilting stunt. Six riders are equipped with masks, cockades and fencing sticks. The contestants are kept within an inclosure sixty feet square, facing the center. At a signal, like knights of old, they endeavor to knock off the cockades from each other's head. The rider losing his cockade is automatically disqualified.

Motorcycle men will participate in a polo game, barrel race, ring race, stunts race, handkerchief race and possibly a pushball contest, similar to that of the mounted men.

In the shuttle race race for foot policemen there will be twenty men on a team. The chariot relay, using snow toboggans as chariots, fifty-one men will compose each team, and in the tug-of-war for foot policemen there will be twenty men on a team.


Dear Prof. Gaelzer:

DADE COUNTY ENTERS 50 ATHLETES IN THE TRI-COUNTY CONTEST

**Central, Riverside, Southside,
Buena Vista, Lemon City
and Ojus Schools Partici-
pate in Dania Meet**

Field and track athletes of 15 high and grammar schools in Dade, Broward and Palm Beach counties are participating in the tri-county meet at Dania, which began at 10 o'clock this morning with elimination dashes.

Dade county has 50 entrants from Central, Riverside, Southside, Buena Vista, Lemon City and Ojus grammar schools, but no entries from any high school in the county.

Broward county is represented by Hallandale, Davie, Dania, Fort Lauderdale, Deerfield and Pompano, both in the grammar school and high school divisions.

Palm Beach county is represented by Palm Beach junior high school, Lake Worth and Delray.

There are three divisions in the meet today, high school, grammar school for boys and grammar school for girls. The events scheduled in the various divisions are as follows:

High school: 100-yard dash; running high jump, 220-yard dash, pole vault, discus throw, 110 high hurdles, javelin throwing, two-mile relay race, running broad jump, 220-yard low hurdles, one-half mile run and shot-put.

Grammar school, boys: 110-yard dash, relay race, shot-put, discus throw, half-mile run, running high jump, javelin throw, pole vault, running broad jump, 110-yard low hurdles.

Grammar school, girls: 75-yard dash, potato race, relay race and eighth-mile run.

Principal R. B. Riley of Dania this morning said that about 360 students are entered for the various events, making the largest field for any meet on the lower east coast in years.

Os sports nos Estados Unidos

minutos de palestra com o jovem rio-grandense F. G. Gaelzer

As suas impressões do grande paiz no que se refere á educação sportiva

Correio do Povo - 1913

Como ha dias noticiamos, regressou, de sua viagem aos Estados Unidos, o nosso conterraneo F. G. Gaelzer, que por espaço de cerca de cinco annos esteve ali se dedicando aos estudos de educação physica.

Foi devido aos esforços da Associação Christã de Moços, que tanto tem feito pe'a nossa mocidade que aquelle joven poudo ali passar tanto tempo, tendo então oportunidade de observar como na grande republica norte-americana são educados os varios sports.

Varios cargos foram, ali exercidos pelo sr. Gaelzer, que é filho do coronel Gaszer, ex-intendente do municipio de São Leopoldo, sendo que entre elles se contiam os seguintes: de 1910 a 1921 — director physico da Hyde Park Y. M. C. A. e estudante do Instituto Tecnico da A. C. M. e da Universidade de Chicago; em 1921 — director tecnico dos Parques de Chicago e instructor das 7ª e 8ª Divisões da Policia da mesma cidade; de 1921 a 1922 — director physico da A. C. M. da cidade de Mexico e empresário do "Asturias Football Club", campeão do Mexico; de 1922 a 1923 — director tecnico municipal das Escolas de Dança e Et. Lauderdale, em Florida.

Dado os cargos importantes que elle desempenhou, procuramos-o afim de obtermos as suas impressões. Sabedor do nosso objectivo, prontamente accedeu ao nosso pedido, resumindo nas seguintes palavras o seu ponto de vista, sobre a educação physica nos Estados Unidos:

— Quando nos Estados Unidos e Mexico, tive a oportunidade de estudar o desenvolvimento da educação physica nesses dois grandes paizes norte-americanos.

Entre as muitas cousas que me chamaram a attenção os pontos mais dignos de nota foram os seguintes:

1º — Os desportos, como maior factor do desenvolvimento physico, tendem cada vez mais a generalizar-se entre as massas e não a uma duxia privilegiada de estrelas.

Com este fim organizaram-se classes de diferentes pontos, como em boxite.

Temporarias e especiais para o sport; no outunno jogam-se o Football, no inverno Basketball e gymnastica interna; na primavera athletismo ou Jogos Olympicos; no verão naturalmente o remo, natação e outros sports aquaticos. Desta forma torna-se quasi impossivel que haja um sport que não encontre uma collocação primordial em um dos referidos ramos, o que é o principal, por sua vez o interesse creado é certo que a forma athletica se conservará em pratica e não no todo para poder competir quando chegar a vez do seu ramo predilecto.

Desta forma todos os socios são de verdade activos o que é de grande vantagem para elles e de um auxilio extraordinario para a agremiação a que pertencem.

Haia visto o que se passa com a Associação Christã de Moços da cidade do Mexico, onde diariamente 200 jovens mexicanos tomam parte activa nos diferentes ramos do Departamento Physico.

O fim portanto a que se almeja chegar, é a generalisação das actividades physica, o hoje educamos tempos em que criamos na sobrevivencia do forte, e hoje educamos o fraco para a luta da vida.

2º — Como a participação em algum ramo sportivo é um habito como todos os outros que adquirimos ao entrar na vida activa, chegou-se á conclusão de que é necessario incluir no espirito do athleta, quando elle ainda mal criança, o habito da actividade physica. Dahi provem a necessidade urgente de introduzir em nossas escolas elementares a educação physica reactiva.

Desta forma incutremos em nossa juventude o habito da competição athletica. A criança por instincto corre, salta e em seus brincueiros faz contorções difficeis de imitar-se na gymnastica mais profissional. Ora o fim a que se deve almeja é conservar o corpo e o espirito joven por toda vida; pois só é velho quem se sente velho.

Hoje em dia até as pessoas que já passaram pelos annos da juventude não devem relaxar o seu corpo, porem devem conservá-lo em treng; garantindo desta forma mais effizienz em seus trabalhos quotidianos e um futuro mais risonho. Na A. C. M. da cidade do Mexico ainda hoje ha uma classe de gymnastica para velhos, cujo direito de matricula é de ter 40 annos ou a honra de pesar mais de 100 kilos.

3º — A Educação Physica hoje em dia está em tal estado de desenvolvimento que os lugares de responsabilidade em seu programma são somente confiados as pessoas que possuem um preparo muito esmerado em Cultura Physica.

Já o conhecer a gymnastica Sueca, não é sufficiente; porem necessita-se o estudo de physiologia para conhecer-se a accção da gymnastica, sobre os musculos e o organismo. Já o ser camarada e ter alguma influencia local, não é sufficiente; é necessario estudar-se psychologia, para poder conhecer o estado de cada individuo. É por isto que hoje em dia os entrenadores conseguem resultados assombrosos dos athletas a seu cargo pois elles são intimos amigos dos mesmos. Nos maiores centros educacionais do estrangeiro, já o departamento de Educação Physica é incluido no departamento de Educação Intellectual e os directores de ambos os departamentos são

são dadas as mesmas responsabilidades. Em consequencia desta organização os alumnos se occupam cinco horas do dia com as classes intellectuales e mais ou menos o mesmo tempo com suas classes de educação physica e horas recreativas. Com um programma de tal combinação consegue-se por em vias de facto o velho adagio "Mens sana in corpore sano".

Com essas ultimas palavras o sr. Gaelzer deu por terminadas as suas breves impressões, impressões essas que são de grande interesse para os que desejam ver cultivados, entre nós, os varios "sports" na verdadeira accepção technica.

Montevideo onde permanecerá dois annos em estudos de aperfeiçoamento physico.

UN REPORTAJE INTERESANTE

IMPORTANTES DECLARACIONES DEL PROFESOR GAELZER SOBRE NUESTRAS ACTIVIDADES FISICAS — SU VALIOSA OPINION.

Se encuentra en nuestra ciudad desde hace varios días, el Director de educación física señor Federico Guillermo Gaelzer. Constatando nosotros que una autoridad como es el señor Gaelzer, nos podría dar su autorizada opinión sobre nuestras actividades físicas, especialmente con todo lo relacionado con el basketball, le pedimos nos dispensara unos instantes para la entrevista, a lo que accedió amablemente el distinguido profesor.

Antes de entrar en materia daremos algunos datos sobre el señor Gaelzer. Cursó sus estudios en el Instituto técnico de Chicago de la I. M. C. A. Perfeccionó sus estudios de director físico, en los principales centros de cultura física de Europa y América. Asistió a la Olimpiada de Stockolmo en 1912 llevando una representación oficial. En 1913 intervino como competidor en la gran fiesta atlética de Leipzig donde tuvo una actuación sobresaliente. Actuó en la Academia de cultura física de Ostende y fué entrenador del team de football que en México consiguió el campeonato de 1922. El team campeón ese año fué el "Asturias". Integró el team de rugby representativo del Instituto técnico de Chicago. Honor que pocas veces se otorga a un extranjero.

Fué designado instructor de la policía de Chicago, en el 7.º y 8.º departamento.

Después de hecha esta breve reseña, pasemos al reportaje:

—¿Cuál es su misión en nuestro país?

—Vengo para adaptar los conocimientos adquiridos en Norte América al espíritu latino. En una palabra: conocer el espíritu latino, para mi futuro trabajo en el Brasil.

para regir cada deporte. Todo está bajo la autoridad de su respectiva comisión. Esto, solo lo había visto en Estados Unidos. La labor de esas comisiones tendrá grandes proyecciones de futuro.

He notado que aquí no se cobra entrada para presenciar la práctica de cualquier deporte. Me refiero a los que están bajo el control de la C. N. de E. F. Y esto contribuye en gran parte al desarrollo del deporte. Ni en el gran país del Norte he podido constatar esto.

—¿Y en basket ball, que opinión le merecen nuestros jugadores?

—La labor personal de cada integrante de team de los que he visto actuar el domingo, es el máximo de lo que puede dar cualquier hombre. Esa labor entusiasta es conseguida por la agilidad natural que cada jugador posee. Pero la misma labor puede ser duplicada, por los medios científicos que les hace falta conocer a los integrantes de teams.

—¿Qué defectos encuentra?

—La parte básica del basket ball que es el pase, el tiro al arco, la combinación y el tiro libre de la línea de toque, no están suficientemente desarrollada. Es en esta parte donde hay necesidad de perfeccionar métodos.

La mayoría de los jugadores norteamericanos no tienen la agilidad de los jugadores uruguayos, pero poseen en cambio la parte científica, que se puede desarrollar en este país con muchas ventajas, agregadas a las excelentes condiciones naturales, que como dije, hacen gala los uruguayos.

—Puntualizando, ¿dónde encuentra deficiencias?

—La primera consiste en que los jueces no cobran los fouls personales. Las reglas no se cumplen en

Omitimos decir que el señor Gaelzer es brasileño.

—¿Por qué eligió al Uruguay para ese perfeccionamiento?

—Los uruguayos tienen en su ciudad la Escuela Profesional Técnica de las Asociaciones Cristianas de Jóvenes, y a ella pues debo concurrir para conseguir adaptar mis conocimientos.

—Conseguido ese perfeccionamiento, ¿qué piensa hacer?

—Radicalme en el Brasil. He sido comprometido por la I. M. C. A. de Porto Alegre.

—¿Qué opinión le merecen nuestras Plazas de Deporte?

—Es admirable el progreso de la educación física en esas Plazas, por el hecho de que esa obra haya sido llevada a cabo con verdadera perseverancia. Todo está hecho con un programa de futuro.

—El solo hecho de venir al Uruguay es porque considero que es el país de sudamérica que más se puede aprender y que mas facilidades da al interesado.

Me ha entusiasmado el sistema de comisiones que tienen ustedes

de visto diferenciar el foul técnico del personal. En Norte América el foul personal es penado severamente, y el jugador que hace cuatro fouls personales, comprende perfectamente que tiene que retirarse de la cancha. En otras ocasiones el apunador advierte al juez y el jugador se retira del field sin hacer resistencia a la observación del apunador.

Es necesario que haga notar, que muchas veces se comete foul personal, sin la intención de parte del jugador de hacer mal. Es casual en muchas ocasiones, pero se pena con el mismo rigor.

—¿Cuál sería su consejo a nuestros teams?

—Ante todo deseo que conste, que estas observaciones son hechas con el solo objeto de contribuir modestamente al perfeccionamiento de los equipos uruguayos, y nunca como crítica. Y agregó enseguida: En este juego que es casi esencialmente de combinación, estas deben ser llevadas en forma tal, que la pelota sea arrojada al arco desde la distancia mas corta posible. Solamente en el caso que la defensa sea muy fuerte, entonces únicamente se puede tirar de lejos.

—¿A qué atribuye la falta de puntería de nuestros jugadores?

—Esa deficiencia que he notado ayer en el match Unión v. Unión Atlético, se debe a que ustedes no ejecutan en forma científica el tiro al arco. Lo hacen por intuición propia. En los grandes centros deportivos se ejercita el tiro al arco tanto o mas que las combinaciones en la cancha. Al extremo que se ha llegado a dividir con rayas, el tablero en zonas, y los jugadores en sus entrenamientos pueden apreciar el efecto y la eficacia de sus tiros, comprobando así como deben tirar y donde deben pegar para obtener ventajas positivas.

Un momento mas conversamos sobre diversos tópicos con el Director físico señor F. A. Gaelzer, y nos despedimos agradeciéndole sus palabras sobre nuestro basket ball, esperando sirvan de aliciente para el perfeccionamiento de nuestros jugadores.

El señor Federico Guillermo Gaelzer cursará en nuestra Escuela, los últimos dos años que le faltan para graduarse de Director de Educación Física. Una breve reseña de su

actuación en el campo de la Educación Física nos hará ver su vasta preparación y su interés por todo lo relacionado con el deporte general.

Los primeros conocimientos de educación física fueron adquiridos en su viaje a Alemania y Suecia, en cuyos países aprendió los sistemas de gimnasia vigentes, habiendo sido también alumno del famoso Instituto Sawdon, de Educación Física.

Poco más tarde pasó a Chicago (Estados Unidos), estudiando en la Escuela de Directores Físicos de la Y. M. C. A. durante dos años, rindiendo exámenes de Director de Plazas de Deportes.

Por cuenta de la Y. M. C. A., tuvo a su cargo una parte importantísima del trabajo en la comunidad, trabajo que excepcionalmente se daba a personal no graduado.

Pasó después a México como ayudante del Departamento Físico de la Y. M. C. A. de aquella ciudad; dos meses más tarde tuvo que ausentarse el Director, ocupando el señor Gaelzer su puesto y toda la responsabilidad del Departamento.

BASKET-BALL

Está se introduzindo o basket-ball em Porto Alegre.

Faz poucas semanas, tivemos a oportunidade de assistir ao primeiro match externo realizado na capital gaúcha. Foi quando os valerosos teams da Associação Christã de Moços e o Collegio Cruzeiro do Sul encontraram-se na cancha do ultimo. Considerando-se o facto de haver sido este o primeiro encontro "sul generis" temos que dar os nossos respeitos ás duas instituições que tão sabiamente souberam evoluir conjunctos tão homogeneos. No "score" de nove a oito, a favor do Cruzeiro do Sul, bem vemos a maneira cavalheiresca e esportiva com a qual actuaram os joven contendores.

Mas que é o basket-ball? Perguntará a maior parte dos nossos leitores. El achamos que lhes devemos uma explicação.

De todos os sports, o basket-ball, foi o unico que teve uma origem premeditada. Em 1893, fazia-se sentir a necessidade de um sport, que fosse adaptavel a um recinto cerrado, como é o salão de gymnastica. Foi então concebida a ideia, pelos srs. Naismith e Gulick, do Instituto Technico das A. C. M., de estudar um exercicio que viesse trazer as vantagens vitaes do Campo de Desportos para o interior de uma sala de gymnastica. Vantagens com as quaes se pudesse tambem usar maior numero de concurrentes mais entusiasmo e cooperação do que até então se estava conseguindo com a callsthenica, os apparelhos, o boxeo e a luta; pois os mesmos não vinham dando sufficientes resultados. Estudaram-se, portanto os velhos e tradicionais sports de foot-ball, la crosse, cricket etc. para ver quaes os seus maiores caracteristicos, chegando-se a conclusão de que a competição, a cooperação e a luta pessoal eram os seus elementos essenciaes e que teriam de ser as bases do novo exercicio sportivo.

Não é de admirar pois, que o basket-ball reunindo em si elementos de tal destaque, haja progredido tão efficazmente. Elle contem symetria de evolução physica; força, destreza e resistencia; lindos émulos de coordenação e habitos de uma reacção physica espontanea. Para desenvolver a iniciativa e o commando o basket-ball é o "primus inter paris" dos exercicios recreativos; tendo como alvo o trabalho para o fim commum.

BASKET-BALL

No principio compunha-se o jogo de dois partidos de numero illimitado, que tentavam collocar uma bola de foot-ball dentro de um cesto, defendido pelos adversarios. O novo jogo foi immediatamente adoptado nas A. C. M. de todos os paises, formulando estas aos poucos o seu codigo e regras definitivas. E até hoje melhoram-se estas regras annualmente. Outras instituições foram gradualmente reconhecendo as vantagens do novo sport, ao ponto que elle hoje em dia, é equiparado, si até já não ultrapassa outras actividades physicas.

O basket-ball moderno requer: uma cancha com a extensão de mais ou menos 25x13 metros, duas canastras ou cestos elevados do solo a uns tres metros; e uma bola de 32 polegadas de circumferencia e 23 onças de peso. E' dividido em dois teams. Cada um composto de um centro, dois avançadores e dois guardas. Tratam elles, por meio de passes entre si, de embocar a bola em seu proprio cesto. E recebem dois pontos toda vez que o alcancem. Para evitar choques entre os jogadores, ha fouls ou penalties pessoais; e para evitar erros technicos de jogo, ha os fouls technicos. Estes fouls são penalizados com um ou dois lances livres ao goal conforme o requerem as regras. A duração do jogo é de dois meio tempos de 20 minutos cada um, com um espaço de 10 minutos para descanso.

O basket-ball é um match, uma contenda; não é uma luta nem um combate; é simplesmente um jogo amistoso. A politica é uma contenda, os negocios são uma contenda e a vida mesmo é uma especie de jogo em que todos somos contendores. No periodo da adolescencia se formam os habitos para uma vida energica e de character. Nesta idade transitoria temos portanto que jogar o basket-ball ou outros jogos semelhantes. E' pois de summa importancia que o Basket-ball reuna em si como factores indispensaveis o enthusiasmo, a honradez, e o espirito nobre. E estamos certos que é este o objectivo e causa primordial de sua propagação.

O futuro do Rio Grande do Sul está nas mãos de sua juventude, usemos portanto o basket-ball como um meio vantajoso para o desenvolvimento dos nossos jovens, verdadeiros baluartes do nosso risonho porvir.

El Basket Ball

Historia y finalidad de este juego

Por F. G. Gaelzer

El basket ball fué inventado en 1892, por los doctores Naismith y Sulich, profesores de la Escuela Técnica de la Asociación Cristiana de Jóvenes de Springfield, en los Estados Unidos.

De todos los deportes el basket ball es el único cuyo origen tuvo un fin premeditado. Había necesidad de un juego que, siendo de salón, fuera comparable, en interés e intensidad a los viejos juegos de football, cricket y basket ball. Después de haberse estudiado todos estos deportes, se trató de fijar sus mayores características y elementos esenciales, y se adaptaron éstos al nuevo juego. No es pues de admirar que el basket ball reuniendo en sí elementos de tal destaque haya progresado tan rápidamente. Este progreso se debe en gran parte a que, en un principio, se enviaron muchos instructores de este nuevo deporte a diferentes partes del mundo. Y así en poco tiempo se jugaba a basket ball en Japón, China y en los países europeos y sudamericanos. En los Estados Unidos se propagó muy rápidamente; el campo donde primero fructificó fué en los gimnasios de las Asociaciones Cristianas de Jóvenes, pero bien pronto se jugó en todas las escuelas y universidades.

El basket ball fué en un principio muy sencillo, tanto en su plan como en su técnica. Se permitía que fuera jugado por cuantos jugadores cupieran en el cuadro. Poco tiempo después se estipuló que el número de jugadores fuera solamente de nueve: un canastero central, dos canasteros laterales, un centro, dos centros laterales, dos defensas y un «goalkeeper». Más tarde, en 1894 el número de jugadores se limitaba o se aumentaba en relación con el tamaño del cuadro del juego.

Teniendo en cuenta que el juego iba a ser practicado en salón, se prohibió, desde un principio, correr con la pelota así como también cargarla. La pelota podía ser pasada o arrojada en cualquiera dirección; no era permitido que se pegase al cuerpo. Cuando la pelota entraba en la canasta por la parte de arriba se anotaban puntos. La pelota usada en un principio, era la común de football, y las canastas eran iguales a las que se usaban para el transporte de frutas. Desde un principio el juego consistió de dos tiempos de veinte minutos cada uno, con un período de diez minutos de descanso.

El rápido desenvolvimiento del juego prueba la sabiduría de sus inventores al dar mucho énfasis a las reglas prohibiendo todo contacto personal y toda brusquedad innecesaria.

contacto personal y toda brusquedad innecesaria.

El movimiento que ha resultado con la formal cooperación de los Comités representando a la «Asociación Cristiana de Jóvenes», a la «Amateur Athletic Unión» y a la «National Collegiate Athletic Association», promete ser la más valiosa influencia en fomentar el desarrollo del basket ball sobre principios limpios y caballerescos, tendiendo a difundir que se juegue *con la pelota y no con el hombre*. Y esto marca al principio de una nueva época en la historia del juego, haciéndolo el más deseable y útil deporte de salón. Con sobrada razón se ha llamado al basket ball, «el rey de los juegos deportivos de salón».

El basket ball es un juego maravilloso para el desarrollo mental, moral y físico de todos los tipos de hombres; la victoria no es lo esencial; mucho menos la derrota; lo esencial es el deseo varonil de sobresalir y mantener la buena voluntad con sus adversarios; con un juego limpio y sin excusas, aún siendo derrotados.

El basket ball es un gran espejo en el que se refleja el carácter y educación de los jugadores. Si uno es pusilánime, se le ve en el juego; si es inmoral y sin escrúpulos, de inmediato se descubre; si es malo y con tendencias de robar en el juego, no pasa mucho tiempo sin que su entrenador o sus compañeros de juego, lo conozcan.

El basket ball se juega hoy en día más con el cerebro que con los músculos. El correr por toda la cancha, seguir la pelota en todo minuto, estar tanto «sobre» el suelo como «en el» suelo, todo esto no cuenta casi, pues no da tiempo para reflexionar. Y en basket ball un gramo de reflexión vale kilos de acción. El buen jugador es aquel que es rápido en coordinar el cerebro con los músculos. La mayoría de los juegos son ganados por rapidez del pensamiento y no por fuerza del ataque.

Todo esto nos enseña el basket ball y tiene como consecuencia, el fortalecimiento del corazón y de los pulmones y una gran resistencia. Desarrolla el dominio propio, la agilidad, la destreza; y moralmente, desarrolla el hábito de trabajar para un fin común.
